2011 Priority Issues

Funding

PCCPTA urges the Legislature to place priority on the basic education programs and ensure that the Florida Education Finance Program (FEFP) be adequately funded to guarantee an equal educational opportunity for all children. Funding formulas must assure equalization of funding for all school districts.

Funding Children's Programs

PCCPTA urges the Legislature to take whatever action is necessary to fully fund strategies and programs that ensure the health, safety and education of the children of Florida.

Florida Tax Structure

PCCPTA urges the Legislature to increase tax revenue through tax structure reform in order to adequately fund services necessary to meet the educational, health, safety, recreational and other basic needs of Florida's children. PCCPTA urges immediate reform of Florida's system of sales and use taxes. Exemptions for products and services should be retained only where they meet an overriding public policy interest. PCCPTA supports amendments to the Florida Constitution that enhance the ability of the state to fully fund services to meet the needs of Florida's children.

Tax Limitation

PCCPTA opposes any tax limitation by constitutional amendment that would limit the progress being made in attaining the state's goal for education and for programs that promote the welfare of children and youth.

Taxes Comprehensive Revenue Restructuring

PCCPTA urges the Legislature to implement a comprehensive restructuring of Florida's tax system with the goals of guaranteeing stable and adequate funding of public schools and necessary services for children.

Facts

Florida is currently ranked 50th out of 50 states in per capita funding for K-12 public education and 39th in per pupil funding.

U.S. Census Bureau, Education Week "Quality Counts 2009"

Although it is the Constitutional duty of the legislature to fund education, property owners are footing more of the public education bill through higher, local property taxes. The state funded 61% of education 10 years ago. Currently, only 51% of education costs are supplied by the state.

OCPS Budget Presentation 2009

Since 2007, Florida's legislature has cut the K-12 education budget by \$1,384,803,118. In 2006, we spent \$7,400 per pupil and today we spend a shocking \$6,400 per pupil. (The national average is over \$10,000.)

2009-2010 Florida Legislature Conference Report

State spending on education as percentage of total resources: Florida ranks 42nd. As a state, Florida spends only 3.1% of its resources on education.

Education Week "Quality Counts, 2009"

Florida ranks 50th in per capita spending on education but ranks 16th in the nation in spending on corrections.

The Alliance for Excellent Education estimates that if the 1.2 million high school dropouts from the Class of 2008 had earned their diplomas instead of dropping out, the U.S. economy would have seen an additional \$319 billion in wages over these students' lifetimes.
